


Dear Friends of Eaton's Neck

A public hearing is scheduled for Tuesday 3/16/21 at 2PM to add boat trainers to prohibited parking between10PM and 8AM each day of the week.

Anthony Lopez wrote to suggest a fundraising idea of decals for residents' cars. The board still has magnetic POENB logos for sale.

We also received a letter from the TOH Highway superintendent, Kevin Orelli that the town will be coming to fix the damaged storm water outflow pipe at Valley Grove - no timeline given yet. Brian O'Conner received the same notice regarding the Essex outflow pipe.

Wall Update:

Steve updated the membership on the latest permitting development. We received DEC approval on revised drawings and the TOH has issued a new permit. We are working now to schedule manpower.

New TOH legislation:

Julie informed us about some new county legislation (resolution1025). Suffolk county towns were directed to reach-out to land owners of unique properties throughout the county to inquire about potential sale to the county for environmental protection purposes. At 402 acres, the largest property on the list is the former Morgan estate. This does not mean the property is for sale or that there is any interest on the part of the land owner. However, it does authorize the county to start a dialog. It is also unclear what the county intends to do with the property if such sale was to go through.

The Board will stay tuned into this issue. One potential benefit of the property becoming government owned is that the displacement of the coast guard dredge spoils will no longer be at

the sole discretion of the current

private owner.

We also feel that potential water quality issues may be averted if the property becomes protected under environmental protection acts. A member informed us that the property has been similarly investigated for public acquisition; once in the 70's then

again in the 80's. Christine Ballow offered that another possibility was that the town could purchase the estates' development rights rendering it passive. It was also noted that the property falls within the incorporated village of Asharoken which likely means they would need to approve any future actions.



One of the many training sessions members of the fire department participate in every year is the "use of portable fire extinguishers". This class reminds members when and how to use extinguishers.

For homeowners, a fire extinguisher can save your home. An extinguisher can make the difference between no damage and total destruction and loss of life. Experts recommend that a home have an extinguisher on each level of the home, and one in the garage. Remember that household extinguishers are meant for small fires. With a larger or fast spreading fire, forget the extinguisher and get out of the house.

Choose an extinguisher labeled "ABC"- that's what is needed to put out the most common types of home fires. There are models that fit under sinks as well as smaller spray-can versions. The basic technique is to start spraying as you move toward the fire, aiming at the base of the fire. Be sure to follow the instructions (read prior to actual use) Remember that extinguishers have a very short discharge time before they run out of fire suppressant (10 seconds is typical) Therefore, there is no time or suppressant to waste! In the case of a small stovetop fire, a pot lid will usually smother the flames and not leave you with a nasty clean up. Please check the expiration date on the label and make sure the pressure gauge reads "full".

Fire safety for older adults is an area of concern in our community. Consider the following. the NFPA statistics. They indicate that the older a person is, 55, 65, 75, 85 the less likely a person is able to escape a fire emergency. For the hearing impaired, get an alarm which flashes or vibrates under the pillow (for night time). Sleep on the ground floor to make escape easier. Have smoke alarms in every bedroom, and practice evacuating the home (like school fire drills), also test smoke alarms each month. Keep a phone nearby to call for help.

. . . . that an immigrant from Scotland ran Beacon Farm on Eaton's Neck?

In 1848, at the age of 15, William Crozier (1833-1904) left his hometown of Hamilton, Scotland and set sail for a life of distinction in America. Having learned farming from his father, William found work on a farm in Boston and quickly advanced to manager. He married Mary in 1863, and one year later disembarked in Northport.

In 1867, Crozier was hired as Superintendent of the 300-acre Beacon Farm on Eaton's Neck, which was owned by Cornelius Delamater a wealthy industrialist. Here, Crozier experimented with selective breeding of livestock. He imported Southdown and Cotswold sheep and bred them to produce

a hybrid which he named Beacon Down.

His efforts won him many top prizes in agricultural shows. He went on to breed cattle. border collies and racehorses. He was in high demand as an



exhibitor

and judge for fairs in North America. He also was the author of "How the Farm Pays," with Peter Henderson, which was published in 1884. It was recognized as one of the best books ever written on the subject.

William and Mary had five children and in 1876, bought the old Carll family farm on Main Street. Upon his death in 1904, he was remembered as a most thorough businessman; honest in all things and, above all, an amiable and delightful friend. He is buried in Genola Cemetery.



Eaton's Neck hangs in the MET

If you find yourself strolling around the American Wing of the **Metropolitan Museum of Art** in Manhattan, don't be surprised if you happen upon a painting entitled Eaton's Neck, Long Island painted American John Frederick Kensett in 1872.

Kensett painted Eaton's Neck in the last summer of his life which he spent primarily on Contentment Island near Darien Connecticut. During that time, he took frequent sails across the Sound to set up his canvas and work. The oil on canvas, along with about 40 other works in various stages of completion, were found in his studio after his death. When bequeathed to the Met they became known collectively as his "Last Summer's Work".

Of those final landscapes, said the NY Times in a 2001 article, "Eaton's Neck is the best known and most haunting. It is a mastery distillation of curving shoreline, water and sky, bathed in a serene light". The painting depicts the bluffs along the east side of the neck just past the lighthouse, looking south toward Asharoken Beach.


